Subject: UNESCO's Global Call for Best Practices in Open Science

Sir/Madam,

In November 2021, at the 41st session of the General Conference of UNESCO, 193 Member States unanimously adopted the first global standard-setting instrument on open science, the <u>UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science.</u>

Developed through a regionally balanced, multi-stakeholder, inclusive and transparent consultation process, this landmark international agreement defines shared values and principles for open science, and identifies measures to make science more accessible, the scientific process more inclusive and the outputs of science more readily available and relevant for society.

To assist Member States with the implementation of the Recommendation, UNESCO is launching a *Global Call for Best Practices in Open Science* to collect best practices in open science on individual, institutional, national, regional and international levels with particular focus on the seven priority areas highlighted in the Recommendation, namely:

- 1. Promoting a common understanding of open science, associated benefits and challenges, as well as diverse paths to open science
- 2. Developing an enabling policy environment for open science
- 3. Investing in open science infrastructures and services
- 4. Investing in human resources, training, education, digital literacy and capacity building for open science
- 5. Fostering a culture of open science and aligning incentives for open science
- 6. Promoting innovative approaches for open science at different stages of the scientific process
- 7. Promoting international and multi-stakeholder cooperation in the context of open science and with a view to reducing digital, technological and knowledge gaps

The resulting compendium of best practices will be made widely available and broadly disseminated and will be a useful tool to better understand the current landscape of best practices in open science, to identify possible gaps and challenges, share lessons learned and improve knowledge and understanding.

I am therefore pleased to invite you to share the online survey on best practices in open science with the relevant authorities, institutions and open science actors in your country.
